## Meet Joseph W. Bennett (Charleston)

Joseph filed a short form SCSR application due to his status as a relative of a current Sons of the Revolution member, his father Ivan Bennett. His patriot ancestor is Col. Antipas Gilman. Antipas was born July 15, 1730 in Brentwood, New Hampshire. He died February 28, 1801 in Gilmanton, New Hampshire. Antipas was buried at the Smith Meeting House Cemetery, Gilmanton, New Hampshire. The Smith Meeting House was the place of his marriage in 1755 to Joanna Gilman. They had eight children: Jonathan, Dudley, Joanna, Alice, Lydia, Hannah, Abigail, Betsey.

Antipas was a Colonel in the NH Troops. He was a delegate to the Provincial Convention in Exeter in 1775. Antipas was a signer of the Association Test in 1776 in Gilmanton. His other recorded positon was as the Overseer of Road Repairs. Antipas occupation was as an innkeeper.

## Meet Jeffery D. Murrie (Florence)

Jeff filed a long form SCSR application. His application was thorough and inclusive on his ancestor, Robert Browning. Robert was born in Culpeper, Virginia on March 15, 1764. He was a resident of Caswell County North Carolina. He died where he resided on April 11 or 12, 1843. Robert served from January to March 1781 under Captain Cole and A. Murphy. He left service to attend to a sick brother. He joined the service again between July to **November 1781 under Captain** John McMullen and Colonel William Moore. On May 7, 1833 he applied for a pension from the service in Caswell Co. NC. Our latest new member to South Carolina Society of the Sons of the Revolution is the son of William R. Murrie. Jeff was born in Greensboro, North Carolina July 1, 1963. He is an Ag Ed teacher K-6 at **Briggs Elementary (Florence).**
