A Special Message from the Secretary

One of the first duties that I received as secretary a year ago was to the complete the semi-annual GSSR Trent Reports.The history of the report can be located in the <u>SR: A</u> <u>History</u>, referenced at the top of this issue of <u>The Crescent Moon</u>

At the 1967 Triennial a trophy was donated by the General President to be held by State Societies for "exceptional contributions to the purpose and good of the SR during the period since the preceding Triennial." In the year 2000, the categories of competition were scaled down to 200+ (large) 100-199 (medium) and **less 100 (small).** 

For our state society, our report was filed in **January 2016**. We recorded 300 points for issues of the newsletter, 400 points for attending the Triennial for a total of **700 points**. In **July 2016** our state society filed the semi-annual report and our total points increased to **3260**.

The increase was due to 1) State Meeting 2) Six events 3) One \$ Contribution 4) Six Newsletters 5) One Educational Activity 6) National Meeting. In January 2017 the category of web site will be added for increased points. *Ivan Bennett, Editor*

It was published by the General Society Sons of the Revolution in 2002. The GSSR Headquarters was located at Fraunces Tavern, 54 Pearl Street, New York City, New York. The Executive Secretary was Cecelia Mahnken and the web site was www.SR1776.org

In a previous issue of <u>The Crescent</u> <u>Moon</u> the history of the Sons of the Revolution in the State of South Carolina was reported, ending in 2001. In that issue a request went out to the membership to provide their own "moments" in our state society history.
